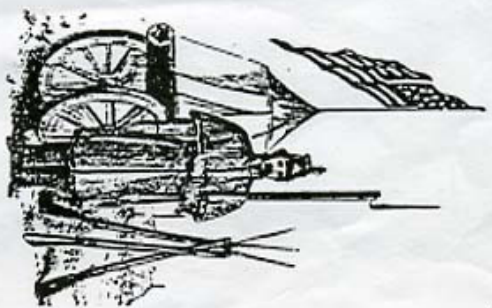


ARMY WOOL MITTENS

This is a two part pattern Cut this part and the bottom out and tape them together



We now have more than 500,000 Soldiers in the Field, Nearly all of whom should be supplied with Mittens at once.

The Cloth Mitten has great advantages over the knit ones. It is estimated that a lady, with a Sewing Machine, can easily make twelve or fifteen pairs of Cloth Mittens in the same time it takes to knit one pair of yarn ones; thus accomplishing twelve or fifteen times as much for the comfort of the Soldier, in the same time, and without any expense for material.

Arrangements have been made with the Quartermaster to supply ladies with material from the U. S. Arsenal, in any quantity desired, by applying to the "Philadelphia Ladies' Aid Society," in the basement of Dr. Boardman's Church, 12th and Walnut Streets, on Fridays; or at our Store, 715 Chestnut Street, at any time.

Mittens may be sent to our Store, 715 Chestnut Street, and we will hand them over at once to the "Philadelphia Ladies' Aid Society," who have kindly offered to distribute them.

This Society is endorsed and recommended by Gen. McClellan, and has the entire confidence of the whole community. They have ample facilities for promptly forwarding the Mittens, or any articles sent them, to the Soldiers most in need of them.



DIRECTIONS

MAKING THE ARMY WOOLEN MITTEN OF CLOTH.

First: Sew the wool, or round piece, on the outside of the thumb piece; then close up the thumb on the back, and fit it to the inside of the thumb hole, where it must be firmly stitched; then, close up the side and finger, and sew on the binding.

It is best to leave the edges of the cloth outside as they serve to protect the sewing, and the Mitten fits better.

To cut the right-hand Mitten fold the pattern with the printing outside; for the left hand, fold the printing inside.

The Mitten may be made of small remnants of any color, by piecing them together before it is cut out. Make the back of the Mitten of the thickest material, as that part of the hand is most exposed. The finger should be made as neatly as possible.

Directions for Cutting out the Pattern.

Follow the printed line at the margin of the printing. also, follow the line for the thumb hole and fold it back, *but do not cut it off*; then fold the pattern exactly in the centre, with the printing outside, and you have the pattern for the right-hand Mitten, just as the cloth should be cut. To cut the thumb-piece follow the printed line, and fold exactly in the centre. The thumb pattern fits both hands.

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
